


#### **Uncovering Truth:**

# The People Behind BU's More English Fairy Tales



### Guild of Women-Binders

1988-1904

#### Founder Frank Karslake:

- Introduced artistic bindings for women
- Hailed a hero to women

#### Where it Succeeded:

- Received high praise and awards
- Purchased by members of royalty

#### Where it Failed:

- Public deception and mishandling of the Guild label
- Exploitation of undertrained women and professional male binders
- Over-exaggerated wages and work desirability
- Women left uncredited for their work



#### Mary Landon Baker


1901-1961

# Love Life of a Chicago Socialite and Heiress:

- Received around 65 proposals, but never married.
- Press reported on same marriage postponed 5 times
- Press reported on various high-profile relationships

#### **Baker and Books:**

- Verbum Sapienti (1920)
- Baker's small library of unusual books
- Bookplate of Venetian palazzo



# Globalization of Fairy Tales

#### Fairy Tales from Origin to Print:

- Originally transmitted orally
- Multiple discovery vs passed via trade and travel
- Collectors compiled books of fairy tales
- Most fairy tales parallels stories from other cultures

## Who Owns Fairy Tales:

- Initially, told by common-folk
- Later, upper-class demanded literary fairy tales
- Some critics advise against altering fairy tales
- Originally not directed at children
