
MLK advocated for a guaranteed income — but only as part of a wider anti-poverty agenda

- MLK advocated for a expansive set of anti-poverty and welfare programs, not just a guaranteed income

SCHOLARLY DISCUSSION

- MLK's advocacy for a guaranteed income was the result of many factors including The Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Voting Rights Act of 1965, The Vietnam War, poor cities in the US, in addition to many other influences
- MLK saw guaranteed income as merely one aspect of a wider anti-poverty policy
- Supporters of basic income today should note that he did not see guaranteed income as a standalone economic cure
