Silenced by Culture

- Syrian and Palestinian WP face cultural barriers when discussing reproductive rights at home
- These issues are seen as threats to family and communal honor
- Women pressured to remain silent due to dishonoring their families at home
- Patriarchal figures, male religious leaders, and NGO staff control women's speech
- When WP are in smaller communities and their work is directly on reproductive rights, WP often refrain from speaking

Silenced by Systems

- Patriarchal and culture and social norms
- Authoritarian regimes
- Occupation and resistance
- Religious leaders
- Islamic and Christian influence
- Targeting of activists
- Violence threats



Silenced in Peacebuilding

- Taboo topics women who address these topics are seen as breaking societal norms
- Violent threats towards WPiE
 - Militias threaten women for speaking about reproductive rights
 - o Private lives being invaded, having to flee due to their lives being in danger



Avenues to Changing Culture

- Create safe spaces for dialogue
- Establish support and groups for reproductive education at home
- Use cultural sensitivity in advocacy
- Strengthen solidarity networks
- Strengthen legal and advocacy support

Courses of Action to Break Systems

- Build community based networks for reproductive conversations
- Engage in conversation with religious and community members about reproductive rights
- Empower women through education
- Raise awareness in exile communities over reproductive rights

Combat Silencing of WPiE

- Amplify women's voices in the media
- Share success stories
- Provide legal protection and advocacy support
- Foster peer networks for WPiE
- Lobby governments and international bodies
- Create mental health facilities in host countries for WPiE
