

1. Analysis of political media & policy debate


2. Analysis of public opinion surveys

4. Assessment of effective messaging strategies



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
Climate denial is not due to a lack of scientific understanding – it's a defense of political identity. Conservatives frequently see climate policy as government overreach.

Environmentalism is often seen as an anti-business agenda and aligned with liberals.

Climate skepticism becomes integrated into group identity reinforced by partisanship.

Ideological identity shapes climate skepticism.	Climate denial is often an emotional defense against values perceived as threatening.
Disinformation undermines trust in science.	Disinformation is a strategic tool that deepens ideologic divides and reinforces partisan identity.
Elite framing influences public opinion.	Emotionally charged media framing fuels tribal loyalty and hinders bipartisan solutions.
Public opinion can shift with the right message.	Economic framing local impacts, & trusted messengers reduce ideologic threat & encourage engagement.
